

ARTUR BURMISTROV, pianist-accompanist

Originally from Russia, Artur Burmistrov arrived in Belgium in 2000. He entered Marie-Paule Cornia's class at the Conservatoire de Musique de Huy and graduated with the highest distinction in 2006.

Under her tutelage, he has won several national and international competitions in Belgium, Italy and France (Lion's Club in Namur, Grétry in Liège, Concours International de Picardie, Rovere d'Oro and Giovani Talenti in San Bartolomeo al Mare, Citta di San Gemini, Citta di Morcone, Andrée Charlier, Dexia Classics, Liège Piano Competition). In 2005, he was awarded the Namurois of the Year prize in the Young Talent category.

In 2011, he completed his specialised Master's degree in piano with great distinction in the class of Jean Schils and Marie-Paule Cornia at the Conservatoire Royal de Liège.

Artur studied with such masters as Daniel Rivera in Italy, Pavel Gililov at the Mozarteum in Salzburg, Jerzy Sterczyński at the Chopin Academy in Warsaw (course offered by the Chopin Foundation), and Jacob Leuschner at the Musik Hochschule in Cologne (Erasmus).

In 2012, he completed a Master's degree in piano accompaniment and the Agrégation in piano at the Conservatoire Royal de Liège. He has worked as an assistant in Marie-Paule Cornia's class and as a pianist-accompanist at courses in Huy and at the International Music Academy in Dinant and Fort-Mahon.

Artur has given concerts as a soloist, piano duo and chamber musician, and has given concert-conferences, notably with Marie-Paule Cornia, organised by the Janssen company on the lives of Schumann, Rachmaninov, Ravel and Schubert in Belgium, Luxembourg, France, Germany and Spain.

Artur Burmistrov is also a passionate accompanist, providing piano accompaniment at numerous concerts, festivals, competitions and masterclasses. He is an active member of the PoéSi association in Andenne. He has worked at the Conservatoire de Huy and is a member of the teaching team at the Conservatoire Royal de Liège as a pianist-accompanist.
